#### **Stable**

Stable patients are those who are not expected to deteriorate because of their complaint or condition.

### Unstable

Unstable patients are those who have deteriorated or have the potential to deteriorate to a significantly worse state or condition. This may be a harmful change in vital signs, sudden decline in mental status, imminent harm from their condition (e.g. cardiac arrest after chest pain, herniation after head injury), or other state of decline.
