How to Use Audio Lectures in the Class

We've found audio lectures to be excellent supplements for online classes.

You can assign topical lectures as one part of an online learning program, but we recommend a more active integration to make sure students understand how to apply the information meaningfully. Some ideas:

- Post a discussion board question for every audio. For example, have students list the three most important things they learned from a particular audio. Then facilitate a discussion on their responses—which will all be a little different.
- Put up a case presentation and ask students to relate the audio content to that presentation. For example, in the respiratory section, you may post a child patient with asthma who has no wheezing who appears tired. Students should get a lack of wheezing as a bad thing (when combined with a tired or lethargic appearance).
- Assign each student to create and share an outline of a different audio. At the end of your online class, students have a ready-made study guide.
